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DX and the Paper Chase

I saw my first television set when I was 12 years old in 1939 at a radio store in North Hollywood...yes, we had radio stores back then. I was fascinated by the end results of this magic box but I wasn't too concerned with the technology. Five years later I was serving in a Gearing class destroyer and once again the communications aboard this magnificent ship fascinated me...the technology did not. Internal communications were accomplished over sound powered phones...yes, your voice powered the system. Ship-to-shore communications were almost always by CW from a radio shack located on the ship's bridge deck. Only 3 people at a time could fit into the tiny shack from which came dits and dahs at machine-gun swiftness. For ship-to-ship communications we had a semaphore signalman waving two flags smartly. I have no clue as to what that was all about, but I was told that he was sending messages. We also had a signalman sending brightly colored flags from the bridge deck to the ship's yardarm, and, finally, there was a searchlight with shutters that were manually opened and closed emulating dits and dahs—all of which fascinated me. Communicating, that's what life is all about. Five years later I was recalled to active duty. There were no changes in the method of how communications were accomplished. Fast forward... I was employed as a sales engineer at one of California's largest mechanical contractors where I was able to apply my communication skills to become the top sales engineer in the company. Life is all about getting your point across with good communication skills. I had one focus in mind when I became a licensed Ham radio operator, and that focus was to properly communicate with people around the world. I've kept meticulous logs from the git-go when HF privileges were first awarded me as a tech plus on the 10-meter band. In totaling up my present computer logging (7200 Q's) plus another 3000 that went away with the loss of a hard drive plus 4500 in my paper logs, I've been a busy radio operator doing the thing that has fascinated me most and that is communicating. My love of this hobby lies in my radio station. I received a QSL card from Andaman & Nicobar Islands (VU4) this past Saturday (the fruits of communicating). I also finished reading 200 Meters & Down, a wonderful story about Amateur Radio from the beginning. This is a quote from the last paragraph in the book. "There are always new goals, new horizons. May it fall to Amateur radio to march many steps toward the goal of complete knowledge ere its footprints are lost in the sands of time." It was written by Clinton DeSoto in the year 1936—Wow! So long from Huntersville for now. 73 and good DX from Bob, WØZPE.



Field Day is always the fourth full weekend of June, beginning at 1800 UTC Saturday and running through 2059 UTC Sunday. Field Day 2011 will be held June 25-26, 2011 **Overview** - ARRL Field Day is the single most popular on-the-air event held annually in the US and Canada. Each year over 35,000 amateurs gather with their clubs, friends or simply by themselves to operate.

ARRL Field Day is not a fully adjudicated contest, which explains much of its popularity. It is a time where many aspects of Amateur Radio come together to highlight our many roles. While some will treat it as a contest, most groups use the opportunity to practice their emergency response capabilities. It is an excellent opportunity to demonstrate Amateur Radio to local elected community leaders, key individuals with the organizations that Amateur Radio might serve in an emergency, as well as the general public. For many clubs, ARRL Field Day is one of the highlights of their annual calendar.

Objective - To work as many stations as possible on any and all amateur bands (excluding the 60, 30, 17, and 12-meter bands) and to learn to operate in abnormal situations in less than optimal conditions. Field Day is open to all amateurs in the areas covered by the ARRL/RAC Field Organizations and countries within IARU Region 2. DX stations residing in other regions may be contacted for credit, but are not eligible to submit entries.

Spectrum Protection Legislation: (ARRL) On Thursday, May 19, Senators Joe Lieberman (ID-CT) and John McCain (R-AZ) introduced S 1040 -- The Broadband for First Responders Act of 2011 -- in the Senate. While it has a similar objective to HR 607 -- introduced in February by Representative Peter King (R-NY-3) -- this Senate bill, unlike HR 607, does not call for auctioning any portions of Amateur Radio spectrum. Both bills call for the allocation of the so-called "D block" of spectrum, 758-763 and 788-793 MHz, to facilitate the development of a public safety broadband network.

On learning in February that a Senate version of HR 607 was being drafted, ARRL Chief Executive Officer David Sumner, K1ZZ, met with staff members of the Senate's Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee who were working on the bill to share the ARRL's concerns with regard to HR 607. "They seemed very receptive to our argument and appreciative of the public service contributions of radio amateurs," Sumner said. "It is gratifying to see that S 1040 avoids impacting our spectrum allocations."
