Membership Meeting Program: The program calendar was reviewed through March 2013, with the special January 31 Membership Drive Program discussed. No Club members have yet come forward to form a planning committee. Upcoming Events: Brainerd Jaycees Ice Fishing Extravaganza on January 19th: we will attend the planning meeting to help plan for their communication needs. Mid-MN 150 Sled Dog Race scheduled for Feb 9: members will be asked to test coverage of the NØBZZ Aitkin repeater for possible event use (147.360 +, 203.5Hz Tone). Possible real-time racer tracking options were discussed. FMS Balloon launch: Al WØRC recently taught soldering skills to 20 7th and 8th grade students, planning a Jan or Feb launch with additional WX-related payloads. Winter Ham Classes to be held for Technician and General licenses by Al WØRC and John WØWY. Program Highlights from the November 29th Meeting:

Al WØRC talked about the Club's involvement with the MN Hospital/Medical Group providing Amateur Radio Communication for the Area's Emergency Needs. This is an ongoing service/drill activity involving the local hospitals, county health offices, etc. Part of that is preparedness for the real events. In that regard, on June 11, 2012, some of our BAARC people participated in the Gone With the Wind exercise held at the fictional Cinderblock City located at Camp Ripley. Our participants were Al WØRC, Ron KØGOP, and John WØWY. The authorities were impressed with our ham radio operators' efficient communication skills and their low-budget volunteer operation. Hams put the professional (public service) efforts to shame. Our system was up and running in minutes—whereas their big-bucks system left a lot to be desired. Everyone learned something from that exercise that will come in handy for future events.

John WØWY provided an update on the Crosby Tower Project. The work is planned, well documented and engineered. The old tower has to be removed and the Cons. Tele. system will be in place. The building is ready. Our gear is almost ready. Help will be needed on the ground. John is also looking for help in finding a "FOX." The fox is an interfering VHF radio signal that covers the 147.030 Crosslake repeater output frequency. Strangely, it is heard approximately on a given schedule from 6-9 P.M. +/- on Wednesdays. We are all scratching our collective heads as to the source. There is no audio—only a very strong pulse-type signal. Can you help find it with your DF gear? More coming. Please contact John. Lyle, KØLFV, came through with his resourcefulness. Since our tentative program presenter(s) could not make it, Lyle showed us that there are some really interesting/informative topics available on the Internet. First off, we got a video tour of our parent organization, the American Radio Relay League. The complex at Newington, CT, is impressive. It is a museum in part dedicated to our hobby from the very beginnings. We take for granted the pioneering work done by Hiram Maxim, W1AW. That call sign forever graces the headquarters station. Many hams, who visit, want to operate it. The multi-towers and massive HF,VHF, and UHF antennas are all evidence that its signals can be copied worldwide. But beware of the Wouff-Hong. Look that up! Lyle also showed us some interesting video clips of yesteryear. Especially noteworthy was one made from an old silent film from the 1950s showing a PA group setting up their FD stations. As we recall, the Club call was W3OK. Interestingly, the film was discovered in the attic by the son of the film's silent-key owner. Some of that old gear is still around and being used. Of course, anything that old and in operating condition would be a prized possession of many antique radio buffs. Nevertheless, it is fun to reminisce. Some presently in the BAARC owned/operated gear from those years. Yet we suspect that none in the Club now used "spark." However, some years ago we did have one who experienced it as a kid. He was George Melin—WØIN of Brainerd. (Thanks, Al, John, and Lyle for the composite program)

DX and the Paper Chase

Happy (belated) Thanksgiving from my shack to yours. What a fantastic DX month this has been. As usual there were ups and downs as far as band conditions went, but it didn't dampen my quest for two new ones. I worked Papua, New Guinea, on CW and St. Peter and St. Paul Rocks on SSB. Imagine this operator working DX and using CW. Both of these are DXCC credits towards my 300 endorsement from the ARRL. St. Paul Rocks was the most difficult contact I've ever made—it was also difficult for the DXpedition operators who were exposed to the sea and some equipment failures along the way. I give them a lot of credit; my hat is off to them. I tried every day for 5 days to get them—sometimes I was on frequency for hours at a time trying to both bust the pileup and listen for my call during periods of weak-signal operation. Since the online logs were not uploaded until after the DXpedition was completed, I was on pins and needles waiting for my call to appear. The PTØS OSL's will be handled by the OORS system that's becoming the way to go for DXpeditions. The cost is around \$5.00 with a couple of bucks going to support the expenses of the DXpedition. This comes at a time when the US Postal Service has announced the discontinuing of IRC's that many DXers worldwide have depended upon for many years. That's it for this month, but remember to sit down at your station and call CQ. Someone somewhere is listening for your signal. So long from Huntersville for now, 73 and good DX from **Bob/WØZPE**.

More Local and National News Relating to our Members and Hobby.

Propagation

According to K7RA, our regular ARRL analyst of the sun and its activity, the solar flux will be the following on the dates indicated: December 5-6, 120; December 7, 130; o December 8-11, 135; o December 12-15, 140; December 16-17, 135; o December 18-19, 130; December 20-22, 120; December 23-24, 115; December 25, 110; December 26-28, 15; December 29-30, 120; December 31, 125; January 1-2 and 130 on January 3-7. What do the flux numbers mean? Here is your editor's opinion: Basically it indicates that the conditions for HF DX should be improved with higher numbers rather than the lower numbers. However, try the bands even when there seems to be no activity because you may be pleasantly surprised. Sometimes their predictions are off. So don't just listen---call a CQ and see what happens. I know that our Club's very active DXer Bob WØZPE would agree. Furthermore, there is some thinking among the experts that Cycle 24 may have two peaks instead of the usual one. Crazy sun, right? Look at how crazy the world's WX is!!!

What else should you make mental note of? The A and K indices. Low numbers (single digits) mean quiet geomagnetic noise----thus good for copying those weak DX signals and pulling them out of the mud. I would like K to be 0-2 and the A to be 7. Add a solar flux of maybe 90-130, and you have fun DX conditions.

K7RA predicts the following A indices for the dates shown: December 2-6, 10; December 7-8, then 5 and 8 on December 9-10; 5 on December 11-15; 8 on December 16; 5 on December 17-31. The New Year is expected to begin slightly unsettled with predicted planetary A index at 10 on January 1-4. Listening to WWV at 18 minutes after the hour can get you these reports. Good luck with this.——Fritz WØKO

Ham Radio and the HMS Bounty —From the ARRL Letter of 11-1-12

Robin Walbridge, KD4OHZ, Missing at Sea after Sinking of Tall Ship *Bounty*; Ship's Electrician Doug Faunt, N6TQS, Rescued Every DXer knows the story of the HMS *Bounty* and Pitcairn Island, VP6: In 1789, the HMS *Bounty* -- a small three-masted sailing vessel sent by Britain's Royal Navy to the Pacific on a supply expedition -- was roiled by tension between its captain, William Bligh. After landing in Tahiti and taking on a cargo of breadfruit, the *Bounty* set sail for the West Indies; it never reached that destination. Instead, Master's Mate Fletcher Christian led the men in a mutiny, eventually allowing Bligh and his loyalists to sail off in a longboat. After an arduous journey, they reached safety at the Dutch-owned port of Kupang. Christian and his followers ended up on Pitcairn Island where they burned the *Bounty* and settled on the island. Passing ships did not discover the enclave until after the turn of the century.

On Monday, October 29, a replica of the *Bounty* – built in 1960 for a remake of the 1962 film *Mutiny on the Bounty* -- sank off the coast of North Carolina as Hurricane Sandy made its way toward New Jersey. Of its 16 crew members, 14 were rescued by the US Coast Guard. *Bounty* Captain Robin Walbridge, KD4OHZ, never made it to one of the two deployed life rafts and is presumed dead. Claudene Christian, who claimed to be a direct descendent of Fletcher Christian, was unresponsive and passed away at a North Carolina hospital on Monday evening.

Doug Faunt, N6TQS, of Oakland, California, was one of the 14 who was rescued by the Coast Guard; Faunt served as a deckhand and was also the ship's electrician. A noted DXer and ARRL Life Member, he was part of the FO0AAA DXpedition crew in 2000 to Clipperton Island. He was also a member of the VP6DIA DXpedition to Ducie Island, and in 2007, he was part of the DXpedition to Lakshadweep. According to Spud Roscoe, VE1BC, Faunt had satellite communications equipment and *Winlink* capabilities on board the *Bounty*, but he was not the ship's radio officer. "Sailing on replica ships was a hobby of Doug's," Roscoe told the ARRL. "He had previously sailed across the Great Australian Bight on a replica of the HMB Endeavour, Captain Cook's ship. He was an able seaman of the watch." Roscoe was the radio officer on the replica *Bounty* for its original voyage to France in 1962.

Faunt told the ARRL that the *Bounty* crew tried various methods, including a satellite phone, to call for help, "but we got nothing when tried calling out on HF. We tried calling the Maritime Mobile Net, but nothing was out there. We had *Winlink* on the ship that we used for e-mail and accessing the Internet to post to blogs and to Facebook, and we finally found an e-mail address for the Coast Guard. As a last-ditch effort, we used *Winlink* to e-mail the Coast Guard for help. Within an hour, we heard a C-130 plane, and later, a helicopter overhead." According to Faunt, it was Walbridge, as master of the ship, who sent out the distress messages. "I don't know how I made it off the ship," Faunt recalled. "I had finished serving a long watch, and then we started going down. I was exhausted. I had to swim to get to the life raft. The water was full of rigging, and here I am, in my Gumby suit, trying to swim. It was so difficult. While swimming to the raft, I came up for air and a spar was coming at me. I finally found a raft and tried to climb into it, but I almost didn't make it, tired as I was. Through the help of my shipmates who were already aboard the raft, I got on." The two life rafts were out about 100 miles from shore when they were rescued.

The vessel left Connecticut on Thursday, October 25 with a crew of 11 men and five women, ranging in age from 20-66. After being treated at a hospital in Elizabeth City, North Carolina, Faunt arrived back home in California on Wednesday, October 31. "I'm looking for a new boat to sail and a DXpedition to go on," Faunt told the ARRL. "Ham radio got me into my position on the *Bounty*, and ham radio got me out alive!" (WØKO Note—N.B. As far as we know the Captain's body has not been recovered)
