DX and the Paper Chase

I've mentioned this before 'I am not an expert on propagation' but I'd like to touch on the past 30 days of propagation and describe it as the good, the bad, and the ugly. There is (as far as I'm concerned) no bad DX, but over the past month there was some really sloppy propagation making DX challenging to say the least. On the good side there was the morning (3:00AM) that I was unable to sleep. I followed my usual pattern of going down to 40-meters and I heard two operators chatting about the good conditions on 20-meters. BAM! I went up to '20' with my monobander pointed into the South Pacific and after the 2nd CQ I was chatting down under with a VK. The 2nd VK was connected with when we were finished. Then after closing with him, someone shouted my call from H44 from the Solomon Islands and in particular, Guadalcanal. It simply doesn't get much better than that. Remember, all of this took place in the wee hours when the high bands are usually closed. This is the sort of activity that keeps me coming back again and again. Those of you who follow my monthly journeys through the world of DX know that I'm now using CW. I'm not really that good, but I'm good enough to get the job done and having a wonderful time with the mode. Just prior to noontime today, I worked a station in Corsica on CW and we had a short QSO, rather than exchanging call signs and a 5NN signal report. I think we chatted for at least 2 minutes and as I think back, it's only been a short time since I decided to operate CW and ... CW rocks. Try it, you'll like it. That's about it from Huntersville for this month, but remember: sit down at your station and call CQ. Who knows, you might get an answer from VK land. So long for now, 73 es gud dx from Bob/WØZPE.

1st Lt. Ron Finger was joined by one of his Cadet COMMS assistants, C/2nd Lt. Emmett Richardson, in presenting this program on CAP's Communications' mission, equipment, and procedures. Brainerd's Crow Wing Composite Squadron is one of 23 within the Minnesota Wing of the Civil Air Patrol, and is comprised of 74 members including 43 cadets. Civil Air Patrol is the official auxiliary of the US Air Force and is tasked with many missions each year including Search and Rescue, Multi–Agency and Municipal Support, and Aerial Imaging. "Composite Squadrons" include Cadets between the ages of 12-18 and provide opportunities in Powered and Glider flight, Aerospace Education, Ground Team SAR Operations, among many others. Recent years have seen the transition of CAP Communications, from ad hoc amateur radio equipment to sophisticated digital HF and VHF equipment supplied by the USAF. Recent opportunities have expanded the CAP COMMS role in support of the Department of Homeland Security, FEMA, and the Air National Guard's Modular Airborne Fire Fighting System (MAAFS) in operation over Arizona.

NEW UHF/VHF REPEATER SITE

After nearly two years of waiting, the BAARC has its new repeater site near Crosby, Minnesota, on-the-air. In the late summer of 2011 the Crow Wing County Sheriff's Department and Consolidated Telephone Company jointly started plans to purchase an old 500-foot community TV tower and replace it with a larger tower, albeit a shorter one at 450feet tall. At that time one of our members, John Luce, WØWY, became the project manager and proposed the Club locate two (2) stations there, one VHF and one UHF. The Club accepted as the "price was right." The primary purpose for the tower is twofold: to facilitate coverage for the new 800-MHz ARMER trunked public safety radio system; and to provide the telephone company a location for some 700 MHz and 3.65 GHz fixed wireless equipment for broadband services in a 15-mile radius of the site. (The site is also used by AT&T for mobile cellular and microwave linking.) The BAARC antennas are located at the top of the tower, and with modest transmitter power output and receiver sensitivity for both VHF and UHF repeaters the coverage seems to be in the 30 to 45-mile range.

The long-range plan is to be able to interconnect any of the Club's repeater stations as all of them are at locations where fiber optic cable is available which would provide a dedicated control path through a central controller to accomplish this. The benefit would be a much larger footprint of coverage with a goal to cover all of Crow Wing County as well as southern Cass and Aitkin counties. This wide-area coverage will in particular help with club service during severe weather months in the SKYWARN program from the Duluth Weather Bureau.

In the past two years many club members have become involved in putting the BAARC equipment on the air. Some of them are Steve, NØCRM; Al, WØRC; Roger, WØWUG; Lyle, KØLFV and Dave, KØNRI. 

Propagation: What is happening with Solar Cycle 24? The outlook for solar flux calls for 105 on July 26 and 27, then 110, 115, 120, 125, 130, 135, 130, 125, 120, 125, 120 and 125 on July 28 through August 8, 120 on August 9 to 12, 115 on August 13, 120 on August 14 to 17, 125 on August 18, 120 on August 19 and 20, and 125 on August 21 to 23. The latest projection shows a short term solar flux peak at 135 on September 4 and 5 after a minimum of100 on August 27 and 28.—Yet another article about the current solar cycle says it is the weakest in the past 100 years, this time from Sky and Telescope: http://www.skyandtelescope.com/news/The-Weakest-Solar-Cycle-in-100-Years-216752671.html Also you can also listen for beacons if you suspect a quiet band is not actually dead (or make some calls.), or as DXer Bob WØZPE says—try the band—call CQ's—somewhere someone is thinking the same thing that the band is dead—but that often is not the case. It is just too many hams listening and not calling. See Bob's column this month. This information is taken mostly from the ARRL and K7RA's propagation reports.—de WØKO
