DX and the Paper Chase

If you're a golfer or a duffer, you'll know what I mean when I say it's that last great golf shot that keeps you coming back for more. When you hit one down the center of the fairway 250 yards, you can't wait to get back on the course next week. It's much the same with DX—whether you hook up with an old friend or work a new one. You can't wait until tomorrow to repeat that good experience. A lot of operators have broadened their horizons by using different modes such as RTTY or PSK to connect with that next DX. I chose CW because it's exciting and it's a challenge. I'm always looking for the next good CW contact because the last one was so satisfying. This past month has been a mixed bag of up-and-down band conditions as the solar cycle continues to be weak. Regardless of all that, there was lots and lots of good DX available. Openings into Europe have been good as well as good openings into Asia. One evening I was working JA's on the 17-meter band well after dark here—early morning the next day in Japan. Also there were several good openings to Australia and New Zealand also late in the evening here. Several days ago most of the DX I was enjoying was without the use of my amplifier—that's how good conditions were. The next day conditions were awful. You never know until you give it a try. There were also good openings on the magic band (6-meters) for a couple of days. By the way, there's an exciting project going on here at my QTH: I'm assembling a new vertical antenna that will give me 9-band capabilities including the magic band and 30 meters for CW. The new vertical is a Hy-Gain AV 680 and when completed, will be installed 8'-0" above grade on a 2" steel pipe. I should be on the air with it in October. That's all from Huntersville for this month as summer is on the wane. Remember, sit down at your station and call CQ, someone somewhere is going to answer you for an exciting QSO. So long for now, 73 es gud DX from Bob/ WØZPE

appreciate the communications support you folks give us every year," said Race Director Kevin Dens, "and it would be difficult for us without your service – thanks to all your members." BAARC members, again this year as they have since the race' inception in 2003, provided public safety and race logistics communications that have been helpful in making this worthwhile community event successful. On Sunday, August 25th, at Whipple Beach in Baxter, some 236 registered participants swam ½- mile, rode their bikes over a 17-mile course, and then ran 3.9 miles through a Baxter neighborhood to the finish line. Tom Christian, VP6TC/VR6TC-SK

Tom Christian, VP6RC/VR6TC, a long-time radio amateur who became known as "the Voice of Pitcairn," died July 7 on the tiny South Pacific Island that was his lifelong home. He was 78 and a descendent (great-great-great grandson) of Fletcher Christian of "Mutiny on the *Bounty*" fame.In 2009 he was diagnosed with possible Alzheimer's disease. According to his wife Betty, VP6YL/VR6YL, his health "deteriorated all too quickly," and the last few months were, in her words, "cruel ones to watch such a strong, vibrant man reduced to where he was not really aware of his surroundings." According to the *New York Times* he was the voice of Pitcairn and with this death the population is now 51.Tom was first licensed in 1957. Over the years, he and Betty kept in routine radio contact with their ham radio friends overseas as well as with two of their daughters who are hams. He was buried July 8 in the cemetery on Pitcairn. (BAARC Editor's Note: Tom made many QSO's with stateside hams—WØKO/KØMAH and KØUSJ, at least two among the BAARC members. Fritz recalls that years ago there was a feature about Pitcairn, Tom, and the Seventh Day Adventist community on the island in *National Geographic*. Details here also taken from the <u>ARRL Letter</u>, and info from Bob KØUSJ).

Note from Greg KØGW, ARRL Dakota Division Director:

On Wednesday, 31 July, I was privileged to present the ARRL President's Award to **Michael Sigelman, KØBUD.** ARRL President Kay Craigie, N3KN, said this in her letter to Mike: "This award is presented to ARRL members who have shown long-term dedication to the goals and objectives of ARRL and Amateur Radio, and whose support of individual programs and/or goals has been above and beyond the normal efforts of ARRL members. It is presented only to those whose truly outstanding efforts have benefited ARRL and/or Amateur Radio operators in the state, the region, or the nation."

The award was presented following the Twin Cities FM Club's summer picnic. Many people attended in order to honor Mike, including three former Dakota Division Directors--Jay Bellows, KØQB, Tod Olson, KØTO,

and Howard Mark, K3HM. Numerous other prominent members of the Twin Cities ham radio community were also present, too many to list here.

The citation on the award reads as follows: **"For decades of service as an ARRL volunteer, club president, hamfest** founder and organizer, and irrepressible ambassador and promoter of Amateur Radio in the finest traditions of the Founding President of the ARRL, Hiram Percy Maxim." Congrats, Mike——also from the Brainerd Club.

NEW Vanity Call Sign Fee: The new FCC regulatory fee of \$16.10 to apply for an Amateur Radio vanity call sign went into effect Friday, August 23, when the new regulatory fee schedule will appear in the Federal Register. Earlier this year the FCC had proposed upping the vanity call sign fee from its former \$15 to \$15.20, but in the Report and Order in MD Docket 13-140, released August 12, the Commission offered no explanation for the higher fee.

WX Service and Local Officials had compliments for **BAARC Skywarn Net.** Even though the Echolink system did not work into the NWS Duluth (not BAAARC's fault), our team locally did a fantastic job 8-26-13 (Monday's storm). John Luce, **WØWY** (our Emergency Coordinator) and John Bowen, **KDØCIZ** (County Official) reported that the communication worked well alerting officials and locals who monitor.
