DX and the Paper Chase

A very Merry and Blessed Christmas to you and yours and ...a Happy and Healthy New Year. A guick overview of DX for the past 30 days might be described as spotty since band conditions varied throughout the period. European DX was mostly available in the morning hours with fair to good signals. On many afternoons I did mostly rag chewing around the country mainly on 17 meters. It's always a thrill to find an open frequency and have my CQ answered for an enjoyable chat with another operator. It's a lot more satisfying than social websites, and it's a lot more fun. I ordered the DVD from the Navassa Island DXpedition (K1N) that was produced by Bob Allphin, a world-class DXer and one of the operators on Navassa. Revisiting the event was both educational and entertaining. The video starts from the very beginning when the permit process started with the US Fish & Wild Life Department (the application process took 13 years) to the last QSO on the 15th of February. What a great bunch of dedicated men, dedicated to this hobby of ours and dedicated to bringing the worldwide DX community Navassa, the number 2 of the top 10 most wanted. Most of the DX community is aware of the expense of an event like Navassa and how complicated the logistics are. This DVD tells the story and I'm proud of having my call in their log as my connection to Navassa. The art of getting the QSL cards for DX contacts to those of you who are having issues with the process is quite simple and in my case its 99% perfect. Send your card with an SASE with postage from the country you worked in the envelope and \$1.20 postage on the outer envelope. Foreign postage is obtained from Bill Plum at plumdx@msn.com — Bill is accommodating and prompt. A tip: I buy all my postage from Bill and presently my \$.49 stamps are costing me \$.42 for mailing first class. You know the drill: call CQ and enjoy this fantastic hobby. Free Ham Radio Licensing Classes Start

The classes start on **Thurs., Feb. 23rd)** and meet at the Brainerd Fire Hall. The classes will meet every Thursday thereafter. A possible review session before the Test Session may be included. The test is Saturday, **April 16**, conducted at the Brainerd Area Amateur Radio Club's annual Hamfest at the Armory. The cost of the current text is \$25 and payable at the first meeting.

The two very experienced and successful instructors are Doug Bergsnev, KDØERE, and Al Doree, WØRC. Both hold the Amateur Extra Class License. They have to order enough texts for those going for the Technician, General, and/or Extra licenses. Please contact them ASAP using their e-mail addresses: **djbdesk@gmail.com** and **wOrc@arrl.net.** They can also respond to any questions you may have about the classes, the three license types, etc. On **April 16**th you will have to pay a \$15 ARRL fee for the FCC test. Of course, beyond the text, the instruction is free—provided by the BAARC as a public service to the community.

Note: US Rep Greg Walden, W7EQI (R-OR), is among the latest House members to sign on as an <u>Amateur Radio Parity Act</u> of 2015 cosponsor: In the Senate, MN. Senator Al Franken is co-sponsor of this bill.

Shown here is a Photocopy of very first issue of <u>QST</u>, December 1915, p. 8. Commemorative Reissues are now available from the League, which is where Fritz WØKO got his. Dues at at that time were 25 cents. Note that the ARRL and its early leaders volunteered hams' service to our government. Remember history? This was the WWI era. H. P. Maxim (W1AW) and C. Tuska, two early founders of the League, supported the organizational effort by themselves—until membership grew to support ham radio collectively.

December Radio Relay Bulletin

SEASON OPENING.

The cool weather has arrived, "static" is getting better every night, and the owners of relay stations are returning to their instruments. It is time to send out another official QST from headquarters. There is much to tell not only our membership, but also every amateur in the country.

First of all; we are confronted with extremely serious national questions. Our country has never before faced a more serious situation. National defense has become a question which every American realizes concerns him personally. The President is preparing plans and the Army and the Navy are both studying carefully every phase of the problem. One of the most important factors is Radio Communication. The great possibilities of the American Radio Relay League, with its organization of over six hundred relay stations in nearly every state of the Union are bound to attract prominent attention. The directors of the League have anticipated this, as will be noted on another page.

Of equal importance is the matter of RELIABILITY and CELEBRITY, as far as the transmission of messages by the League is concerned. We have had a year's experience and we have learned many things. We have found our membership enthusiastic and willing but we have not been efficient always in getting messages through. The directors have something to say on this point, which the membership should carefully note.

The matter of frequent issue of Bulletins to the membership has been something which has been given thought, and every amateur should think carefully about what the Directors say about this important subject.

NATIONAL DEFENCE. OUR SERVICES OFFERED TO GOVERNMENT.

When it became evident that our government intended to seriously take up the question of improving our national defense, the following letter was prepared and sent to the Secretary of the Navy:---

Secretary of the Navy, Washington, D. C.

Sir:-

In connection with your plans for national defense, it may be that the organization of the AMERICAN RADIO RELAY LEAGUE, INC. will be of service. We respectfully present the following information concerning this League.

It has been in operation one year. Its membership consists of over six hundred amateur radio stations in thirty-eight states of the Union. Except for gaps in the southern tier of states, we are able to communicate to all important points at the present time.

A list of our official relay stations is given in the enclosed "LIST OF STATIONS." There are over two hundred additional stations which have been appointed and which are awaiting publication of the third edition of our List.

The development of this League of amateur wireless telegraph stations has been carried on under the full knowledge of the Bureau of Navigation, Department of Commerce. Frequent conferences are held between our Chairman and the Commissioner of Navigation, and his assisting District Radio Inspectors. The League is managed strictly in accordance with a spirit of co-operation with Government authority. Our influence in correcting small technical infractions of the radio laws has already been successfully exercised in several instances.

In order to insure transmission along trunk line routes, the Bureau of Navigation have issued to certain stations indicated by this League, a Special License to use a transmitting wave length of 425 meters. The regular amateur is limited to 200 meters. Several of the Special Licenses have already been issued where the geographical location suggests their value. During the next sixty days, we hope that several new Special Licenses will be issued to stations in the Middle and Far West, which will be of great assistance to us in reaching Pacific Coast points with certainty and despatch.
