President Charles W5CCL opened the meeting at 4:10 PM with 10 board members in attendance. A motion to accept the published minutes for June was approved. The Treasurer's Report was then presented by Doug KDØERE and approved following a motion by Fritz WØKO and second by Al WØRC. The Treasurer reported on the very successful Club Hamfest. The annual July event is the main revenue source for the Club's treasury, and this year made a substantial profit from admission and raffle ticket sales, kitchen sales, Club equipment table sales, and vendor table fees. Raffle ticket sales were up this year with new ham and Club member Chris KDØLFA selling 148 tickets. Veteran “Ticket-Master” Fritz WØKO outdid himself, selling 478 raffle tickets! 166 attendees visited over the four-hour Event.

Digital & Emergency Communications: John WØWY reported on a presentation he gave to the Pequot Lakes Police and Police Reserve on July 20th. John's presentation to the 15 department members outlined the communication capabilities of BAARC amateurs in providing communication support and assistance. John used the SKYWARN protocol with the NWS in Duluth as an example, and discussed what we do, and don't do, as a preliminary dialog in orienting that department towards the possibility of working together in the future.

Al WØRC reported on the continuing repeater work that is taking place at the Club station site at BHS-South Campus. Although it is not the final working location for the repeater, the BHS site provides easy access for testing and configuring the repeater, which will ultimately find a home atop the Ski Gull Hill northwest of Brainerd. Roger WØWUG, having already completed the main work in converting the commercial gear for amateur use, will assist Al in the final preparations and testing.

Al also has installed “shape files” on the APRS computer in the Club trailer with the help of his friend Jerry NØMR (Two Harbors). These additional files will provide map overlay capability for NWS weather watches and warnings along with the normal APRS map data. Al also reported on the installation of a 9600 Baud UHF packet repeater at the Club high-rise repeater location. This will allow for reliable high-speed text communication by radio in an emergency.

Upcoming Events: Community & Special Events Co-Director, Dave KCØTGT led a discussion about three upcoming Club events: **The Lakes Country Triathlon, Tour of Cuyuna Country Bicycle Tour, and BAARC Picnic & Foxhunt.** The Triathlon is under new management this year with the Brainerd Kiwanis Club, and they have been in touch with Dave as to their communication needs. A need for 4-6 operators to conduct course sweeping and other duties is anticipated. The event will be held at Whipple Beach in Baxter on Sunday, August 29th, with a start time of 8:30 AM. The Cuyuna Bike Tour is a more ambitious event, communications-wise, and will be held on Saturday, September 11th. The Club Picnic will be held in lieu of our August Membership Meeting as usual, at Lum Park, Brainerd, on Saturday August 28th at 10 AM. Terry KIØFW will be providing both short and long-range “foxes” for this summer-end event.

Old Business: John WØWY was asked to proceed with the purchase of magnetic vehicle signs for Club events. The signs are black lettering on a white background, and read “Radio Communications,” as on our Club vests. He will provide a unit cost for any other members that wish to order their own along with the Club order at the next (September) meeting. A motion to purchase magnetic signs for the Club was made by Al WØRC, and seconded by Fritz WØKO, passing unanimously.

Fritz reported a visit by former member, George KCØBH, who had generously donated his radio gear to the Club. George asked Fritz to greet Club members for him, and to say that he will try to attend a future Saturday breakfast meeting.

Charles W5CCL reported what seems to be a lack of interest from the local Boy Scout organization following attempts to interest them in amateur radio. This winter he and Ron KØGOP spoke briefly at a leadership meeting on the possibility of working with them on Radio Merit Badges, JOTA (Jamboree On The Air), and invited them to visit the Club Field Day site in June. Although there seemed to be an interest in pursuing these activities by those present at the meeting, no follow-through has been seen from their end, nor any visits to the FD site. Charles reported that he would once again contact them to determine if there is any further interest in amateur radio projects.

New Business: Al WØRC and Shirley KØDCW have made an outreach on behalf of the Club to the Wadena Area Amateur Radio Club (WAARC). After working in the ECOMM support efforts in Wadena following the June 17th tornado, they became aware of the inactive status of that club. In an effort to jump-start the group, they held a “club breakfast meeting” for amateurs there on Saturday, July 24th. As a result the WAARC will begin to hold monthly meetings on the second Monday of every month at the Todd County Meeting Room. Following this encouraging outreach, John WØWY suggested contacting the Walker, MN, radio club to see if a similar effort is needed there as well.

Following a motion by Fritz WØKO and a second by Dave KCØTGT, Al and John were asked to purchase new ARRL Technician Class Books with the updated 2010 question pool for use in future Ham classes. Steve NØCRM will post a reminder on the Club calendar to reserve the date for the Brainerd Armory for next year's Hamfest. Reservations are taken on a first-come basis following October 1st.

Regarding future Club Programs: Fritz will contact Frank N1UW about a program on Software-Defined Radios such as his Flex-5000, and Charles will invite Gordon NØZRD to do a program about providing communications support for the recent MS Bike Tour that passed through the Brainerd area.

The Board Meeting was adjourned at 5:20 PM.

DX and the Paper Chase

Nobody can hear you listening,—think about that statement for a moment, and the next time you're on HF remember...how do you know the band is dead? I've been guilty of the same thing as I tool around the bands hoping for some activity. Sometimes I think I'm the only operator calling CQ especially when several stations come back at the same time. I've preached the value of being the first to set the tone for a good QSO or even a good DX station that might hear you calling. Okay, so the bands were lousy for the most of the month, but this doesn't mean I gave up looking. I worked plenty of DX because I know that they're looking just like I am. Calling late in the afternoon a few days ago with one of the yagis beaming 320° I worked a weak signal from Alaska as I was looking for Japan. I'll take Alaska and even though it was difficult, we made it work for a nice QSO. This morning I was able to work an old friend in Hong Kong as the bands were behaving with nice openings around the world. I still get an adrenalin rush breaking into a pileup, and Charlie Ho had half of North America trying to get him. I hope there will be better days ahead, for Cycle 24 continues to baffle all of the pundits. I have a confession: the opening sentence was something that was passed to me by WØKO. Thanks, Fritz! HF radio is alive and kicking, so sit down at your station and call CQ because I'll guarantee there's someone out there listening for your call. So long from Huntersville, 73 and good DX from Bob/WØZPE.

MS Bike Tour—A Report: Dave KCØTGT and Charles W5CCL reported that the MS Bike Tour through our area went well and that the officials appreciated the use of the BAARC repeater. Dave and Charles put in many hours—stormy/rainy WX included. Mike KJ5WU and Mary KC5EGV of Browerville also assisted. Tom KØHHF started them from their church south of Brainerd on the first day. It was a well organized tour with lots of equipment and talent. From home Fritz WØKO noticed the changing/threatening WX conditions, so he relayed direct broadcasts of the NOAA station at Leader via our repeater. That way all the principals could hear the same information at the same time. Dave also stated that ham radio proved its superiority again when a medical emergency arose, and the cell phones would not work in that particular location. All the volunteers' effort was appreciated. Thanks again for your involvement. Charles hopes to have the chief of operations at a future BAARC meeting to present a program.

Wadena County Tornado (June 17, 2010) and Ham Radio Volunteers from the BAARC and

Todd County EC Mike Wisniewski, KCØTAF, led a total of 53 individuals in volunteering 1,040 ham/hours over a seven-day period. A Review of NVIS
At the July membership meeting, Steve **NØCRM** reviewed in pictorial/slide show format the annual event. In the same presentation, the subject of suitable NVIS antennas came up again. Near-Vertical-Incident-Skywave is a way to make contacts on HF using low power during daytime hours over a short distance—in an area not covered easily by VHF. Inverted Vees and similar ones are used for that purpose. If you are interested in getting more information on these antennas for your own use and for a future Field Day venture, contact Steve, **NØCRM**, our Vice-President.



2010 BAARC Hamfest Another Success: On the day before (Fri., @12 noon), we had a crew getting the Armory ready and many of the same crew helped with the takedown on Saturday afterwards: Al WØRC, Shirley KØDCW, Kathy KD5EGN, Charles W5CCL, Skee WØDCY, Fritz WØKO, Lyle KØLFV, Gary KØPOW, Chris KØLFA, Dustin KØLEV, Alan AAØAS, Dave KBØSCT, Jeff KØHBI, Tom KØHHF, Ted KCØVTW, Dave KCØTGT, Ron KØGOP, John W3MQD and Jerry NØMR. The kitchen crew of very capable YL's did the work preparing on Friday and ended with the cooking, serving, selling and cleaning (the latter a big job no guys like to do). They were Shirley KØDCW, Kathy KD5EGN, Kaye NØTMZ, and Michelle NØCALLyet (YL of Jerry NØMR). Skee WØDCY put up and took down the signs and helped with lunch-area cashiering. Doug KØERE performed the treasurer's duties with the cash flow and accounting: he will give us the statistical detail of how successful this year's event was. Charles W5CCL, our president, sold tickets at the registration area, welcoming our visitors from around the state with his friendly Texan demeanor. Ed KAØEXB was again helping register at the big door, especially for the vendors. This year he had able assistance for part of the morning from Dave KBØSCT, retired Crow Wing Co. Emergency Director. Using his selling skills and knowledge of gear, Lyle KØLFV did great work selling the donated items for Club—he was busy all day barely resting. Marilynn, Lyle's better half, helped with coffee and donuts/rolls sales in the morning. Also working the crowd selling raffle tickets were newcomer Chris KØLFA and veteran seller Fritz WØKO. Following plans, tables and chairs for the vendors were set up so equipment could be sold. Dan Fish and company of Radio City and Teresa Starry's Embroidery were both busy. Another interesting first for us was vendor QRZ.COM. Its friendly owner Fred AA7BQ engaged many in conversations related to his business and service—Fred came all the way from Arizona to experience friendly Minnesota and its climate. Needless to say, such a successful event takes preparation—often a full year in advance. Lyle KØLFV and Al WØRC, the co-chairs for the Hamfest, again did just that. At previous ham radio events around the state/area, they distributed flyers advertising it—this was also done via the Internet and announced on area nets, both VHF and HF. Also important to mention is Dave KCØTGT's role in superbly tracking the drawings and making timely announcements, putting out the friendly voice of the Club to our out-of-town guests. With assistance from Ken KFØNG, the two made the drawings for the prizes flow smoothly—with drawings done by neutral parties. Lots of people left with smiles on their faces: many for having a successful day selling their wares, some also for having won something unexpected, and others leaving with a memorable purchase or two. Quite a few were seen leaving with something that was free—often unheard of except for Brainerd's Hamfest.

Another aspect of our hamfests, as in recent years, was a VE session; John WØWY, Al WØRC, and Terry KIØFW were VE's. NØWSH and WØKO were standbys. Jerry KØOLEU upgraded to General. Of course, ultimately for the whole event it was a volunteer effort on the part of the Club members, who all paid for their own tickets, standard procedure of our Club. What are our expenses?—Of course many, it is for the rental of the building, hundreds for the prizes, etc. These are not the only expenses—many of the volunteers donate goodies for the Club to sell. As a result of the high costs, we also try to recover some of the expenses from table rentals @ \$12 each and raffle tickets in denominations of \$1 culminating in a special drawing that requires a gambling permit from the State for \$50 for just that day. From the Entrance Ticket Drawing the winners of various prizes were KØMGF, WØKF, KØLEV, NØUC, KAØZLG, NØCN, KØDEJ, KCØTSQ, KCØNTW, W3MQD, KBØSQX. The Raffle Prize Winner was Dustin KØLEV—a Yaesu FT 1900. We can surely say that the Club members who volunteered for the event had fun, even though they left tired from their two-day schedule. Latest on Vanity Call Signs from ARRL/FCC:

On July 19, the Federal Communications Commission announced via the Federal Register that the cost of an Amateur Radio vanity call sign will decrease 10 cents, from \$13.40 to \$13.30. The new fees take effect 30 days after publication, making August 17, 2010, the first day the new fee is in effect.
