November 20, 2008 - 4:00 PM - BAARC Board Minutes – Small Mtg. Room- Brainerd Public Library

The meeting was opened by President Lyle KØLFV while in attendance were Vice President Steve KCØYTE, Treasurer John W3MQD, Coordinator of Public, Digital and Emergency Services Al WØRC, Director-at-Large John WØWY, Advisor Shirley KØDCW, Advisor Roger WØWUG, and Secretary Darrell ABØVP.



The Report of the October Meeting as published in the BAARCer was accepted as written. Treasurer John W3MQD led a discussion of the Financial Report dated 10/31/2008. John WØWY moved to approve the Financial Report; the motion was unanimously approved following a second by Al WØRC.

Lyle KØLFV and John WØWY reported on a meeting with the emergency people for the Jaycees Ice Fishing Extravaganza. BAARC was requested to develop a radio link with Reichert Bus Company to improve logistic and medical communications. There will be badges for better security control. Also busing and re-busing. location signage will be improved.

Al WØRC reported on the month's activities in Digital & Emergency Communications. Following a discussion of the Gull Lake repeater antenna project, John WØWY moved to approve an additional dollar amount to meet the amount billed to BAARC; it was unanimously approved following a second by Al WØRC. Steve KCØYTE moved with a second by John WØWY to make a BAARC contribution of \$100 to the ARRL Spectrum Defense Fund that was approved. The Board approved a resolution to provide an interface with the existing Kenwood 850 and Ham Radio Deluxe software following a motion by John WØWY and second by John W3MQD.

John WØWY will be meeting with Al Larson on the Mid-Minnesota Dog Sled Race for Winter 2009. The meeting was adjourned about 5:00 PM.

November 20, 2008 - 7:00 PM - BAARC Membership Meeting Minutes – Brainerd Fire Hall

President Lyle KØLFV opened the meeting with about twenty Hams and guests in attendance. The October Membership Meeting Minutes as published in the BAARCer were accepted as written after a motion by John W3MQD and a second by Jim WØYA. Treasurer John W3MQD presented a Year-to-Date Financial Report dated October 31, 2008. Jim WØYA moved to approve the financial reports that were unanimously approved following a second by Curt NØCRM.

DX and the Paper Chase

DX is...the essence of Amateur Radio. If it were not for the desire to send a signal over the hill, then over the water, and then across the oceans, and around the world, Amateur Radio, or even wireless itself would probably have been dismissed as a useless laboratory phenomenon. This is a quote from the ARRL operating manual dated 1997 and it sums up what my passion is for this hobby. There is nothing better than a far-away DX station to get my adrenalin boiling. This past month the 17-meter band has been "the place to be" for all of the good DX you ever wanted. I worked a new one for DXCC credit on 17 that isn't heard very often...UK and Soviet Bases on Cyprus with the call prefix ZC4. This isn't the rarest of calls, but you just don't hear them often on the bands. On Sunday afternoon (4:00PM) there was a pipeline of propagation into JA-land and the signals were pure and clear. I called one CQ and for the next 45 minutes I had a mini pileup on my station from Japan! How good is that? The mailbox was good to me this month also. My cards from Botswana and from the Beijing Olympics arrived giving me two more confirmations for DXCC 300. Without fail, you can find me DXing into Europe every morning on 17-meters with pretty good signals. Today (11/18) I worked 20-meters into North Africa beating out the pileups which by the way is as much a thrill as getting through to the actual DX. Cycle 24 is on the way without a doubt and my plan is to haunt the bands and take full advantage of the wonderful world of DX. In closing, I need to mention that the 15-meter band has also been open sporadically with excellent signals, but you have to pick up that mic and call CQ! So long from Huntersville. 73 for now and good DX from Bob/WØZPE.

## **NVIS—What is it and what is it for? Here is a synopsis of the November Program given by Steve Mott, BAARC VP.**

The program subject was NVIS Communications. NVIS is Near Vertical Incidence Skywave communication, which is a method of communications that includes an antenna with a very high take-off angle (65-90 degrees). This high take-off angle allows the signal to return to earth via the ionosphere's F-layer, in very close-in ranges (0-400 miles). This distance can typically be in the skip zone of many "normal" HF antennas.

Interestingly, using NVIS can provide very reliable emergency communications in mountainous areas and even for general day-to-day communications when the distance to a repeater may be too far. The NVIS system, like all general HF communications, is dependent upon daily ionospheric changes. Consequently, multiple bands will be required for complete 24-hour communication channels.—**Steve KCØYTE**

**The International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA) and its Use:** Periodically it is a good idea to review it. We use it to spell phonetically our call signs, names, locations, and other important information that may not get communicated accurately because of unique voice traits, poor radio conditions, such as fading or noise. Also many of us have lost hearing capabilities: however, as a courtesy we can all compensate for these conditions by using the IPA. This information may be especially useful for new hams. Of course, those who have served in the military have heard it before.

DX News from the ARRL:(As of Dec.4)

GEORGIA, 4L. Andy, UU4JMG is QRV as 4L/homecall and is usually active on 160 meters around 2200 to 0300z, as well as 40 and 20 meters using CW. QSL to home call.

CHINA, BY. Operators BD3BXH/2, BG3DCI/2 and BG3DDB/2 will be QRV from Juhua Island, IOTA AS-151, from December 10 to 13. Activity will be on 80 to 10 meters using CW, SSB and RTTY. QSL via BD3BXH.

SOUTH COOK ISLANDS, E5. Lars, SM6CUK is QRV as E51CUK from Rarotonga, IOTA OC-013, until December 9. Activity will be on 80 to 10 meters using CW. QSL to home call.

IRAN, EP. Moshen, EP3SMH is generally active using RTTY on 20 meters around 1400z.

CROZET ISLAND, FT/W. Florentin, F4DYW will be QRV as FT5WO from the French Alfred Faure Base, IOTA AF-008, from December 8 to November 30, 2009. Activity will be mostly on 40, 20 and 15 meters and possibly 80 meters. QSL direct.

SAN ANDRES AND PROVIDENCIA ISLANDS, HK0. Cal, WF5W, Mike, K5UO and Rob, HK3CW are QRV as 5K0CW from San Andres Island, IOTA NA-033, until December 12. This includes an entry in the ARRL 160 Meter contest. QSL via W5PF.

GUINEA-BISSAU, J5. Peter, HA3AUI is QRV as J5UAP and has been active on 20 meters around 0830z and 17 meters around 1010z. QSL to home call.

ANTARCTICA. Helmuth, W6KDX is staying on Amundsen-Scott South Pole station until Jan 5, 2009 and if time permits may be active as KC4AAA. Activity will mainly be on 20 meters SSB. QSL via K1IED.

Propagation from ARRL as of Dec.5 via K7RA —Good conditions on 160 meters with day-to-day variations. 6-meter openings, including possible meteor showers instead of sporadic-E being the predominate mode at times, and 30-meter mid-day openings to Europe.
