SOLAR UPDATE:

Tad "He smiles upon their sunny faces" Cook, K7RA, this week reports: The data at the end of last week's bulletin showed daily sunspot numbers from April 16-22 as six zeros, then 11. In fact, every day was at zero until April 21, when it was 11; it moved again to zero the next day, April 22. We had just as many zero sunspot days -- and only one day with a sunspot -- but we saw the sunspot on Tuesday, April 21, not April 22. We had two additional days with a sunspot this week, Wednesday and Thursday, April 29-30. The sunspot number was 15 and 12, respectively, on those days. But this was another old Solar Cycle 23 sunspot, and it appeared near the western limb. By today, it may have either faded away completely or rotated out of view, May 1. The data at the bottom of our bulletin shows seven days, Thursday through Wednesday for the reporting week, so the sunspot number of 12 for Thursday will appear in next week's data. Sunspot numbers for April 23-29 were 0, 0, 0, 0, 0, 0 and 15 with a mean of 2.1. The 10.7 cm flux was 70.6, 69.7, 69.4, 69.2, 67.7, 68.8 and 69.5 with a mean of 69.3. The estimated planetary A indices were 3, 5, 4, 5, 4, 2 and 3 with a mean of 3.7. The estimated mid-latitude A indices were 0, 5, 2, 3, 3, 2 and 3 with a mean of 2.6. NOTES on Dr. Glenn Johnson's K5D Desecheo DXpedition deWØKO

BAARC members were fortunate to hear another excellent presentation on a superb DXpedition. WØGJ has put on several others for us in the past—Heard Island VKØIR in 1997 and his Bhutan trips. Glenn and his wife Vivien KL7YL attended the fine dinner served by the Niswaw Legion Club, thanks to the arrangements made by Jim WØJDS and Pres. Al WØRC and others. Desecheo is the small island some 14 miles from Puerto Rico that the US military used for target practice. The K5D team had to get permission from various entities to operate from there and put "another country" on the radio DXCC map. The effort of the team was recognized by many as first-class. Did you know that some 115,787 QSOs were made by the team of 15, splitting their efforts into three groups. Also it was not cheap, costing nearly \$116,000—that is nearly \$1/ QSO. Glenn said the team had many supporters from around the world. Glenn's presentation is always educational, informative, and humorous—all with power-point graphics and pictures with audio. The program appealed to the diehard DXers among us and also to the casual enthusiasts who learned about that unusual piece of geography owned by our country and what effort it takes to put on an operation like K5D. We also learned that he has quite a ham paradise in Bemidji. Interesting to note is the fact that the Johnsons have traveled widely and have many family members licensed. Glenn's dad is also a ham. What is next for Glenn? Watch for an upcoming DXpedition to another needed "country"—perhaps Navassa Island located just off Haiti. The BAARC thanks Glenn for coming to Niswaw for this talk.

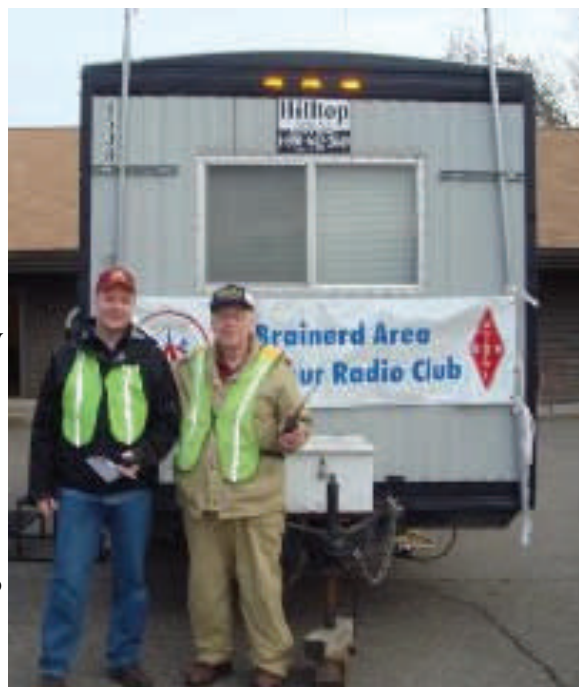
DX and the Paper Chase

As the club newsletter goes to press we're still in a solar minimum of over 600 days and counting. The average solar minimum is said to be 485 days. At any rate, there is plenty of good DX out there if you're willing to keep an ear to the bands and a watch of the DX spots. To prove the point...I've worked 6 new countries in the past several weeks including Mozambique (C91), Lord Howe Island (VK9), Mongolia (JT1), Western Sahara (SØ4) and Central Africa Republic (TLØ) and of course Desecheo (K5D). Even without sunspots there was enough propagation to work good DX. As the month of April winds down there is always hope that cycle 24 will kick in. I've been working quite a bit of 40-meters especially in the wee hours of the morning with success into both VK and ZL land. Recently I discovered that instead of watching TV after sundown that there was activity galore on '40' from Europe which was/is more exciting than the 'boob tube'. I'm operating 40-meters with a ground mounted vertical which is bringing in good DX from around the world. The high bands over the past week (04/10 to 04/20) have been noisy and without much good DX activity. There were several minimum openings during that time frame into Europe and Asia but it was sporadic. As usual, I avoid 20-meters unless I spot a DX station I would like to contact. It seems that '20' has become a haven for lids, kids and space cadets and I don't want to leave out the frequency cops. The pileups are unmanageable with rude operators and poor operating techniques. I don't mean to paint with a wide brush but...a few bad guys make it miserable for the good operators. Perhaps a lot of this sort of thing will go away when all the bands are open again. Don't forget to pick up that mic and call CQ...someone somewhere in the world is listening for your call. So long from Huntersville, 73 and good DX from Bob/WØZPE.

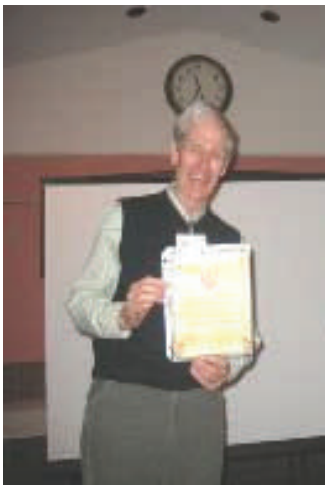

Jim and Sharon Duit KØTXT/KBØSQX sent this good advice and we think it would be worth sharing—even though you may have seen it before:

PUT YOUR CAR KEYS BESIDE YOUR BED AT NIGHT:

Tell your spouse, your children, your neighbors, your parents, your doctor’s office, the check-out girl at the market, everyone you run across.

Put your car keys beside your bed at night. If you hear a noise outside your home or someone trying to get in your house, just press the panic button for your car. The alarm will be set off, and the horn will continue to sound until either you turn it off or the car battery dies.

This tip came from a neighborhood watch coordinator. Next time you come home for the night and you start to put your keys away, think of this:

It's a security alarm system that you probably already have and requires no installation. Test it. It will go off from most everywhere inside your house and will keep honking until your battery runs down or until you reset it with the button on the key fob chain. It works if you park in your driveway or garage. If your car alarm goes off when someone is trying to break into your house, odds are the burglar or rapist won't stick around... After a few seconds all the neighbors will be looking out their windows to see who is out there and sure enough the criminal won't want that. And remember to carry your keys while walking to your car in a parking lot. The alarm can work the same way there.... This is something that should really be shared with everyone. Maybe it could save a life or a sexual abuse crime.

P.S. I am sending this to everyone I know because I think it is fantastic. Would also be useful for any emergency, such as a heart attack, where you can't reach a phone. Share this.
